POLITICAL UPDATE: SCHOOL CHOICE

This past Tuesday I was invited to a lunch meeting in Raleigh to hear reports regarding education and school choice. The meeting was sponsored by the Civitas Institute and the Friedman Foundation. The first presentation was a lengthy report on a survey that was recently conducted regarding attitudes towards school choice issues. The second report was from the Heritage Foundation and various initiatives around the country regarding school choice. The meeting concluded with a panel discussion with three key NC Legislators and moderated by Terry Stoops of the John Lock Foundation.

I found the sessions helpful and informative and wanted to share a few key points with you. According to the poll:

- 1) Most people in NC do not know how much money the state is spending on education. In fact, only 8% of the people survey guessed within the correct range. The per pupil funding (i.e. the tuition your tax dollars are paying to the schools your neighbor's kids are attending) is a little over \$8,500.
- 2) Most people in NC have generally negative feelings about the public school system. 52% gave the schools a grade of fair to poor on one question but said the system was on the "wrong track" (55%) compared to heading in the "right direction" (29%).
- 3) If they could, about 40% would send their children to a private school.
- A majority of North Carolinians favor TAX-Credit scholarships (65% of those surveyed) and also support Education

Savings Accounts.

What does all that mean? Essentially this, most North Carolinians don't know how much we're paying for the schools we don't like and would prefer the opportunity to decide where our tax dollars are spent when it comes to our children's education.

What are our legislators doing? Well, in 2011 a program was launched that allows parents of special needs children a tax credit of up to \$6,000 that can be applied to private school tuition. It is estimated that the state will save about \$10,000,000 dollars over the next four years because the average per pupil spending on special education is over \$10,000. Right now, a program, called the Opportunity Scholarship Bill, is being proposed that would extend a tax credit to businesses if they donate to a fund that would provide scholarships to lower income families to attend private schools. Additionally, work is being done on a proposed educational savings account program much like your healthcare H.S.A. This year's legislative session could be very interesting for school choice advocates.
