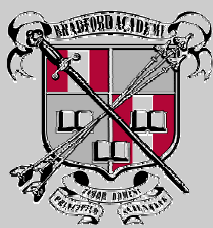

KINDERGARTEN

Math: Reading graphs; congruent shapes; grouping items by 10's; adding 2 digit numbers with regrouping; assessments.

Phonics: Target sounds - hard Cc, Kk and -ck together at the end of a word; C and K with short vowels; short vowel beginning sounds.

History: Review of our timeline so far.

Music: Reviewed American folk instruments and listened to folk songs from around the world; began learning the hymn "There is a Fountain Filled with Blood."

Art: Featured artist: Jan Vermeer; will reproduce *The Girl With the Pearl Earring*, using pastels.

P.E.: Dribbling a basketball, part 2.

P.E.: Basketball.

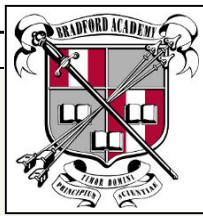

5TH GRADE

Math: Using Prime Factorization to Reduce Fractions; Dividing Mixed Numbers; Lengths of Segments; Complementary and Supplementary Angles; Reducing Fractions before Multiplying.

be wrong, and even to be kooks. Changing hearts and minds is the job of the Spirit through teaching the Word. The government's job is to protect liberty." I had become apathetic and indifferent towards the actions of those in power. When my naïve perspective was challenged, I realized I had not developed a sensible Biblical perspective on this crucial part of adult life. I had already come to the conviction that the Word should shape the way we think about our personal lives but it was fresh to me think that the Word had to even shape my views of government and politics. It made me realize that my thinking about how society was run has indeed a

towards the political process. One of the many dreams I have for this school is that we would equip students with the tools necessary to provide wise godly leadership in the political arena. You may have heard me mention that I want the name of Christ to be spoken in the marketplace of ideas. Washington and Raleigh are certainly a part of that marketplace.

To that end, we will continue to teach our children about our own civil heritage and provide opportunities for our students to meet people involved in the
