MEMORIALS OF THE END OF WAR

Our Middle School students again experienced a fascinating and moving memorial to the legacy of this great nation. On Wednesday, they were able to visit Appomattox Court House and the National D-Day Memorial. While both sites did not memorialize the actual ending of war, they did signify the beginning of the end. Appomattox is the site at which Robert E. Lee surrendered the Army of Northern Virginia in April of 1865. The rest of the confederate generals had all surrendered by that summer. The D-Day Memorial commemorates the Allied Invasion of Normandy in 1944. Again, the actual battle did not end the war but it essentially signaled the end of Fascist domination in Europe.

Both sites highlight the determination, courage, wisdom, and honor of the military leaders and their soldiers. Both events illustrate the majesty of human conviction and honor; and at the same time, the depravity of the human heart. Both sites illustrate the paradox of peace. That is, peace is worth fighting for.

Let us never forget that like the Battle of Appomattox and D-Day, the turning points in history are not the end of warfare. The end of war will ultimately come when the eternal King completes the work that He began at Calvary. Until then, we fight.
