History: Code of Hammurabi

Grammar: Contractions **Phonics:** Continental "a"

Spelling: Sight Words

Reading: Little House in the Big Woods

Latin: Test (Chapters 13-17, Review)

Science: Introduce Layers of the Atmosphere

MR. JOHNSTON (3RD GRADE)

Math: The students have been doing very well with their multiplication speed drills. This week we worked on lines and symmetry and reflections, and reading and writing large numbers.

Reading: We began another novel this week taking a step away from mythology to read the wonderful children's classic *Misty* of *Chincoteaque*.

History: Greek Philosophers

PE: Kickball

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Grammar: More with interjections and conjunctions, compound parts, and homonyms; Chapter Ten test; capitalization and punctuation rules.

Latin: Chapter 15 - Sentence Patterns A (SN-V) and B (SN-LV-PrN).

Writing: No writing because of spelling bee and snow day. We'll return to story writing next week!

Science: We commenced our study of the order of planets in the Solar System, and began learning general characteristics of the Earth and the Moon.

Music: Composer of the quarter - Gioachino Rossini.

VERSE: Matthew 6:25-27 and I Thess. 4:9-12

MRS. HAMILTON (4TH GRADE)

Math: Multiplying by three-digit numbers that Include zero; probability; writing quotients with mixed numbers; subtracting a fraction from 1.

History: We learned about St. Francis of Assisi and his order of *Fratres Minores*.

Literature: Students are greatly enjoying their journey into the magical world of Narnia.

Writing: We continued working on the retelling of the story of Exodus; also, students practiced writing three-point expository paragraphs and began working on a three-paragraph essay from "The Lipn,

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the Witch, and the Wardrobe."

Grammar: We reviewed and practiced capitalization and punctuation rules.

Latin: This week, we reviewed all Latin pronouns and practiced with them by creating sentences and a cartoon strip.

Art: After last week's pencil project ("The Rose"), we returned to paintbrushes and watercolors by illustrating a *Saturday Evening Post* cover while learning about our artist of the quarter, American artist Norman Rockwell.

Science: Students reviewed the order of planets in the Solar System and learned the meaning of revolution, rotation, and axis in regards to planetary motion, and how it affects the seasons and day versus night.

PE: We continued our flag football unit this week.

Music: Composer of the quarter - Gioachino Rossini; practice recorders this week.

MISS WINDES (5TH GRADE)

Math: Review and test; Adding Three or More Fractions; Attributes of Geometric Solids.

History: This week's card focused on the various ways the British government began encroaching on the rights of the British citizens in the colonies -- the Sugar Act, the Stamp Act, and other events leading up to the Boston Tea Party!

Reading: We began *Duel in the Wilderness,* reading about how the Virginia governor sent young George Washington on a perilous mission through unknown territories.

Grammar: Review of direct objects; learned how to spot fragments and turn them into complete sentences.

Writing: No writing because of spelling bee and snow day.

Art: Continued working on our Tolkien projects.

Music: Composer of the quarter - Gioachino Rossini; practice recorders this week.

PE: We continued our flag football unit this week.

Science: This week the students started learned about light years, stellar magnitude, and the poles of the Earth.

Verse: Philippians 2:3-4

Upcoming Tests: Grammar, history, and spelling on Friday.

MR. GARBER (6TH GRADE)

Math: This week math 8/7 learned about fractional parts of a number and areas and angles of a parallelogram.

History: This week the students learned about the age of industry. Each student was required to research and present on a different person in this time period.

Literature: We continued reading Around the World in 80 Days.

Logic: This week we did not have logic because of the spelling bee.



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Science: This week the students learned about the moon phases, tidal shifts, and lunar eclipses.

PE: We started our flag football unit this week.

Grammar: Chapter Ten test, review of sentence types, improving writing through recognizing and combining sentence types, fact and opinion, propaganda techniques.

Composition: IEW Chapter Eleven; more with narrative structure; vocabulary quiz.

Art: We continued our work with human figures, drawing them in motion by connecting 3-D shapes.

Music: Composer of the quarter - Gioachino Rossini; began viewing his most famous opera, The Barber of Seville.

Verse: Ephesians 2:17-19

MR. HAMILTON (7TH GR.)

Math: This week math 8/7 learned about fractional parts of a number and areas and angles of a parallelogram. Algebra $\frac{1}{2}$ learned about semicircles, changing rates, and solving equations in two steps.

Logic: This week we did not have logic because of the spelling bee.

Science: This week the students learned about water entering and leaving the atmosphere. They also learned about clouds.

Grammar: Dependent and independent clauses; improving writing through recognizing and combining sentence types; Chapter Twelve test; indirect objects.

Composition: Writing workshop for our upcoming creative writing anthology.

Greek: Chapter Twelve verse, vocabulary, grammar, worksheets, and quiz; translation work with Bible verses.

Omnibus: This week we finished our unit on Plutarch. Students did projects on individual lives, incorporating dialogue and drama to demonstrate their knowledge of a particular historical character. We ended our unit with an essay and look forward to tackling the great Greek playwright Sophocles!

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possible and expand our community.

Although there is a close "de facto" relationship with Grace Reformed Baptist Church, the school has sought to operate as an independent ministry working for the good of the general Christian community to the glory of God. Bradford Academy pays rent to the church and receives very generous use of these facilities, for which we have been very grateful! Because of our low facilities overhead, we've managed to run a very lean and stable operation. We are also happy to have been able to keep our classes small allowing our teachers to provide excellent attention to the students in each class. Our hope is that we've been able to offer the best education possible despite our limited resources. Because of our dedicated parents and many providential opportunities, our children have had experiences comparable to any school in the area at any price.

Here is the tension we face as a non-profit. We want to make our services available to the greatest number of families which means keeping our tuition low. On the other hand, we need to create and provide the best educational experience for our students which means attracting and keeping the best professionals of the highest caliber AND making excellent resources available to them. This, of course, costs money. Additionally, we want to give as much individual attention as possible to the students which means we keep the class size small. Our public school system has a tuition greater than \$8,000 per pupil (paid by you the tax payer). They put three times as many students in each class. Consequently, their revenue flow is significant. They are then able to provide many services that we do not.

I believe we can continue to build this school in faith and with God's blessing. I believe we can do more with less and our children will reap the benefits. However, we cannot do it alone and we need the continued support of our Bradford community. We especially have to pull together as we plan and build our program and launch our high school in the year after next. We also need the support of the greater Christian community. We would appreciate any suggestions on how to better connect with your home church and its leadership. We also need prayer and would appreciate having the school added to your church's regular prayer schedule. I see these next few years as important or maybe even more so than our first few. The Lord saw us through our initial launch and I trust He will see us through this next phase.

Probably our greatest need at this time is to

enlarge our budget. I believe that the best way to do this is by expanding our enrollment. We had tremendous growth last year and trust that as word spreads into the surrounding community, we will continue our steady expansion. To that end, we have decided that we will not increase tuition this year but hold at the current level. For the 2015/2016 school year, the cost for KINDERGARTEN will remain at \$3,349 and 1st through 8th is \$5,615.

If we could add a student or two to each grade and grow most of the grades to a class size of 10 to 12 students, we would be in very good shape moving forward. Thankfully, we have already received applications for eight new students. If all of those applications turn into enrolled students, we would be well on our way to meeting our goal for the new year.

Our next biggest need is to increase our supplies and equipment to a level appropriate for high school classes. We feel this pressure acutely in the area of science. It is for this reason we will dedicate the funds raised at the BRADFORD ACADEMY LEGACY GALA and AUCTION towards purchasing the equipment needed to begin outfitting a science room. We hope to be able to purchase several items including quality science tables for the students, a portable teacher's demonstration table, storage and safety equipment, chemistry and biology lab materials and supplies. The next project would be to grow our arts program including both visual and musical arts. We also will need to grow our athletic program to insure that the seeds that have been sown this year will grow into robust opportunities for our children. Our goal is to nurture the whole person and will strive to make as many opportunities available for our young scholars.

The investment we make now will surely pay dividends in the lives of our children. I believe that by working together for the good of our students, Bradford Academy will grow to be a beacon of light for those families striving to raise the next generation in the fear of the Lord. We face many difficulties ahead as we challenge the prevailing culture and seek to restore a kind of education our children need. We face opportunities to make a real difference in this culture because we serve a God who has the answers to our problems and gives us grace in even the greatest trials. It is to Him we turn and to Him we give the glory.
