AN OPEN LETTER TO OUR MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS FROM A MOM

My dear middle school friend,

Thirteen years, 4 months and 27 days ago, my first child entered the world. Then I blinked. Just once. Maybe twice.

And suddenly, I found myself sitting in a meeting to hear about the plans for high school. HIGH SCHOOL. I sat there wide-eyed and dumbfounded. "How is this possible?" I questioned. And I was not alone. I sat beside your parents and they were wide-eyed and asking the same question too, especially if you are their first child.

Some of you were there. Wide-eyed as well, and overwhelmed, though for different reasons. You listened to Mr. Johnston share his visions and plans for how to produce strong Bradford graduates, ready to take on the next phase of life: COLLEGE. You heard words you didn't fully understand: Senior thesis, credits, admissions essays, electives, PSAT, ACT, SAT. You came away with more fear than excitement and more questions than answers. And that was an appropriate response.

You see, these 4 years of high school will play a large role in determining the course your adult life will take. Will you do enough, succeed enough, *be enough* to satisfy the stringent requirements of the college of your choice? Will you choose your course of study wisely, and produce the grades you need to produce to then secure a great job

opportunity?

The stakes are high. The pressure is on. You need to make a case as to why the University of X, Y, or Z should offer you admission into their fine institution of higher learning, when there are a thousand other people vying for that spot. This will require much of you. You will need to prove your self-sufficiency and resourcefulness, your commitment and reliability.



Latin: We reviewed and practiced using the 4th conjugation as well as our new vocabulary; we spent time this week practicing translating from English to Latin.

MRS. HAMILTON (4TH GR.)

Math: This week in Math we learned about the properties of geometric solids and units of capacity, reviewed the mean, median, mode, and range, and completed our unit assessment.

History: At long last, we have reached the age of the Renaissance. Students were very excited to learn about Dante Alighieri and Francesco Petrarch of the early Renaissance and about the artistic innovations of artists of the high Renaissance era such as da Vinci, Michelangelo, Raphael, Titian, etc. I look forward to the students' presentations next week!

Writing: Students completed their reports on Roman gladiators and began working on their Renaissance projects.

Literature: We continued reading the Reformation story from the perspective of Martin Luther's son, Hans, in our new book, *Thunderstorm in Church*.

Grammar: This week in Grammar we began working with indirect objects in pattern three sentences.

Latin: We began our study of demonstrative pronouns with the pronoun "this" in its masculine, feminine, and neuter forms; students continue practicing their quick parsing and translation skills.

Science: Students made their own study guides for our Earth Science quarter test next week; they should review the guide a little bit every day as part of their homework.

Art: We learned how to draw objects in two point perspective, and noted the differences between drawing in one and two point perspective.

Music: We are fine-tuning *Spring from Vivaldi's Four Seasons*. Continue working on memorizing the whole song.

P.E.: This week was the kickball field trip.

MISS WINDES (5TH GR.)

Math: Capacity; Area of a Triangle; Using a Constant Factor to Solve Ratio Problems; Review.

History: Our focus this week has been the dreadful winter George Washington and the Continental Army spent at Valley Forge, doing their best to hold together

Reading: Johnny is finally settling into his new job as a messenger for the newspaper office and his friend Rab, and he is also beginning to come into contact with influential characters - Samuel Adams, Paul Revere, and others as the Revolutionary War is on the horizon.

MR. GARBER (6TH/7TH GRADE)



Omnibus I: This week we continued with Plato, focusing intensively on his famous dialogue *Phaedo*. In *Phaedo* Socrates is on his deathbed, just one or two philosophical discussions away from his now-famous death scene. In this dialogue Socrates covers such classic philosophical topics as the nature of the true philosopher, the existence and immortality of the soul, particulars and their relationship to universals, and accidental and essential properties. We had a grand time poring over these ideas and analyzing them all from a Christian worldview.


Latin: We finished working on chapter 20. Remember a little vocabulary practice everyday will pay dividends.

MR. HAMILTON (8TH GRADE)

Algebra: The students learned about word problems with two statements of equality and value problems.

Science: The students learned about acceleration, density, and how to solve problems with different units.
