

From the Teacher's Desk

MRS. RIVERA (K)

Math: Counting nickels, dimes, and pennies, identifying fractional parts of a whole, graphing tags on a bar graph, writing observations about a graph, measuring line segments to the nearest centimeter, and identifying geometric solids.

Phonics: Special exhibit words, adding "es" to a word, review of "TH" words, and review.

History: Discussed the Constitution of The United States, sang the B.C. History Fact Song, and worked on our quotes for the Patriotic Program.

Science: Human body unit- circulatory system

Art: The students finished up their collage on George Washington

Music: Learned how music tells a story; continued to prepare for patriotic program in May.

Hymn: "Glorious Things Of Thee Are Spoken"

Verse: Ephesians 6:1-3 and review for Bible Bee

MRS. CAMPBELL (1ST GRADE)

Math: This week we practiced estimating and finding area, acting out and drawing pictures for "equal groups", writing number sentences for "equal group" stories, identifying perpendicular lines, subtracting three-digit numbers with money amounts, and estimating differences.

Phonics: Final GE/DGE/NGE; GE/GI in Initial and Medial Positions

Grammar: State of being verbs

History: We continued memorizing the Preamble to the North Carolina Constitution and working on NC state booklets.

Science: Introduced sound as a form of energy that is a result of vibration (high pitch=fast vibrations, low pitch=slow vibrations), Bird of the Month: Eastern Bluebird

Art: Students began drawing their own unique portraits of George Washington.

Music: Students reviewed notation using takadimi and then had fun making music with Boomwhackers (even playing Haydn's *Surprise Symphony*.

Verse: Psalm 67:1-7

MISS STEVENSON (2ND GRADE)

Math: Multiplying a Single-Digit number and a Multi-Digit Number Using the Multiplication Algorithm, Identifying a Function Rule, Simplifying Expressions Containing Parentheses, Multiplying Three or More Factors, Using the Associative Property of Multiplication, Writing Tenths Using Common and Decimal Fractions, Measuring to the Nearest Tenth of a Centimeter

History: Solomon's Reign

Grammar: How to Address and Envelope, Sections of a Library

Phonics: VCVCV or VCCCV Patterns in Long Words

Reading: Baby Island - reading aloud and looking for information by using key words

Art: Students continued practicing portrait drawing by sketching a partner.

Music: Finished watching Mozart's opera, *The Magic Flute*.

Science: Discussed Reflection and Refraction, Bird of the Month: Field Sparrow

P.E. Frisbee Golf

Verses: Review Proverbs 25:6-28

MRS. MITCHELL (3RD GRADE)

Math: Identifying Perfect Squares; using order of operations; writing common & decimal fractions as percents; assessments.

History: Constantine and the Edict of Milan

Reading: Finished *Archimedes and the Door of Science.*

Latin: Ch. 30 test; Ch. 31, review chapter.

Grammar: Business/thank you letters to auction donors.

Writing: Keyword outlines and 3 staccato sentences.



Music: Finished watching Mozart's opera, The Magic Flute.

Art: More with 3-D shapes.

P.E.: This week the students played ultimate frisbee.

Science: Bridge building competition part 2. Bridges are being redesigned this week.

Verse: Review of all verses.

MRS. HAMILTON

(4TH GRADE)

Math: Students learned to use percents to name part of a group and to multiply decimal numbers by using zeros as placeholders, and they enjoyed learning more about elapsed time by analyzing schedules and writing their own word

problems about their selected itineraries.

History: This week in History we learned about The Council of Trent.

Writing: Students brushed up on writing mechanics and began working on their own versions of a medieval story.

this year, This Was John Calvin. After completing and dedicating The Institutes to King Francis to plead for the cause of the martyrs, Calvin is ready to embark on a new journey as a pastor in Geneva.

Grammar: This week we learned how to form plurals; we also learned how to write business and thank you letters.

Latin: This week we continued our sentence writing/parsing/ translating intensive, added several 3rd-conjugation verbs to our vocabulary, and learned the endings to third declension neuter nouns.

Science: Students completed their medieval machines and began experimenting with firing them.

Art: We spent another week working on the Alhambra watercolor pieces!

Music: Please continue practicing Over There. They will not Upcoming Tests: be playing measures 8-15 but should practice the rest of the Wednesday, May 11: Ch. 17 Latin Test song; students also practiced other pieces for the patriotic Thursday, May 12: Ch. 18 Grammar Test program.

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Verses/Memory: Psalm 139: 1-6

MISS WINDES (5TH

GRADE)

Math: Review and test; Compound Experiments; Ratio Problems Involving Totals; Mass and Weight.

History: We have spent the week learning about the War of 1812 - the reasons it began, its part in the writing of our national anthem, and about a couple of its major battles.

Reading: We have begun *Treasure* Island, a book filled with pirates, adventures, treasure maps, and ships! This week we have met our characters and been introduced to the setting of our tale.

Grammar: The students were

introduced this week to differentiating between regular and irregular verbs and choosing the helping verbs for those verbs.

Latin: Besides learning a new set of vocabulary, we have reviewed infinitives in English and Latin and learned the chant for an irregular verb that fits well with a wide variety of infinitives - to be able.

Literature: This week we continued reading our final book for Writing: We focused this week on writing with a variety of sentence structures and put that into practice with our final Johnny Tremain writing assignment.

> Art: Most of the sketching is finished and the painting has begun in earnest on the masterpieces each of the students chose.

> Music: The students were able to continue watching Rossini's opera, The Barber of Seville; they also continued preparing for patriotic program

Memory: 1 Samuel 2:7-8

Science: This week we began learning about static and current electricity; students are looking forward to next week's class, when they will be building complete circuits.

P.E.: This week the students played ultimate frisbee.

Friday, May 13: Math, History, and Spelling Tests

R.E.: This week the students played ultimate frisbee.

From the Teacher's Desk (cont')

MR. GARBER (6TH/7TH GRADE)

Math: The students learned about formulas and substitution, how to find the slope of a line, and transforming equations.

Science: The students learned about different types of energy including potential, kinetic, and chemical.

History: This week the students learned about the Cold War and communism. We discussed how communism seems to be a great idea on the surface, but it is a broken system.

Grammar: This week we looked at prepositional phrases and what they modify, as well as verbals.

6th Literature: This week we finished *The Hiding Place*. Students did a wonderful job reading and reflecting on this profound and moving text. After our assessment, a seminar on the major characters and themes of the story, we moved on to our final novel of the year, *Fahrenheit 451*.

Logic: This week the class learned about the exigency propaganda technique. This technique puts pressure on the other person by giving a limited amount of time to act.

Music: The students began learning songs for the patriotic program.

Art: The students continue to work on their watercolor landscapes.

P.E.: This week the students played ultimate frisbee.


Verse: We finished the book of Philippians this week! Now we will start to review what we have memorized all year.

Omnibus I: This week we finished reading Virgil's *Aeneid*. Students were transfixed as they read the long and detailed account of the final battle between the Latins and the Trojans. In addition to much discussion of the major events, themes, characters, and language of the epic, students compiled a scrapbook of their critical interaction with the text and created their own worldview shields after those made for Aeneas by Vulcan, replete with pictures, text, and thematic designs.

MR. HAMILTON (8TH GRADE)

Algebra: The students learned how to factor advanced trinomials, how to multiply radical expressions, and how to solve a conjunction or disjunction.

Science: The students learned about the nature of electricity. Specifically we talked about static electricity this week. Next week we will start discussing current electricity.



Omnibus II: We turned our attention this week to Chaucer's Canterbury Tales. In preparation for this classic piece of literature, we took a closer look at the developments of the High and Late Middle Ages, including the rise of the English language, which was well on its way to becoming the language we recognize and use today. This week we read Chaucer's charming prologue and read and analyzed "The Knight's Tale," a classic medieval romance, and "The Wife of Bath's Tale," a surprisingly complex examination of gender roles.

8th Composition: This week we continued to work on our quarter papers, finalizing outline structures and making solid progress on our first drafts.

Music: The students began learning songs for the patriotic program.

Art: The students continued work on copying their chosen portion of a masterpiece by painting and sketching.

P.E.: This week the students played ultimate frisbee.

Verse: Colossians 4: 10,11.
