### (3RD GRADE)

**Math:** Finding the area of an irregular shape using a grid; subtracting 2 digit numbers using mental computation; identifying and solving "larger, smaller, difference" story problems; Phi Day celebration - the Golden Ratio.

**History:** Greek Philosophers: Socrates, Plato and Aristotle

Reading: Began Misty of Chincoteague

Latin: Chap.15 - Action verbs and with linking verbs.

**Grammar:** Chapter 11 - Capitalization and punctuation rules.

**Writing:** Keyword outlines and paragraphs about the Greek Philosophers.

**Music:** Third grade began music class this week with prayer and our Weekly Praise Verse (Psalm 100:1 - 2). Then we spent time listening to the music of our new Quarterly Composer, Back.

We had a lesson in Music Theory as we reviewed the Musical Alphabet and the notes of the Treble and Bass Clef. Then we enjoyed singing our warm-ups and Quarterly Hymns.

**Science:** Began unit on Chemistry with an introduction to Robert Boyle & the vocabulary of chemistry: atom, element, molecule, compound.

## MRS. HAMILTON (4TH GRADE)

**Math:** Students learned about using letters to identify geometric figures, estimating arithmetic answers with rounded and compatible numbers, subtracting a fraction from a whole number greater than one, and using money to model decimal numbers.

History: St. Francis of Assisi.

**Writing:** We began learning the essential elements of a research paper, after which students came up with a series of concept questions and hypotheses in preparation for our next massive

writing project—a research paper on a subject from the Middle Ages.

**Literature:** Students were excited to embark on our next reading adventure—C.S. Lewis's *The Lion, The Witch, and the Wardrobe.* 

**Grammar:** We continued working with capitalization and punctuation rules.

**Latin:** Declension of *duo (two) and Roman numerals.* 

**Science:** Fourth graders were excited to create supersaturated sugar solutions and begin growing their own crystals in the color of their choice.

Art: No art this week - short week.

**P.E.:** Ultimate frisbee; getting ready for the P.E. competition on 2/23.

**Music:** This week Fourth Grade spent time listening to our new Quarterly Composer, Bach. Then we had a lesson on Music Theory where we reviewed the notes of the Treble and Bass Clef and the Musical Alphabet. Then we reviewed what we have learned on recorder so that we will be ready to continue our lessons next week. Finally, we sang our warm-ups and Quarterly Hymns.

## MISS WINDES

Math: Rounding Decimal Numbers; Mentally Dividing Decimal Numbers by 10 and 100; Decimals Chart; Simplifying Fractions;

Reducing by Grouping Factors Equal to 1; Dividing Fractions.

**History:** We finished studying the French and Indian War this week, learning about the different sides and their motives, the Battle of Quebec, and the Peace of Paris treaty.

**Reading:** Besides finishing some final discussions about *The Hobbit* and brainstorming for a five paragraph essay about a theme or character in *The Hobbit*, the students are beginning to read either *Duel in the Wilderness or Witch of Blackbird Pond.* Students have the opportunity to read one or both of these books, but they will focus their written assignments and discussions on one or the other.

**Latin:** We began a new chapter this week, learning the vocabulary and reviewing all four verb conjugations and how to spot differences between them.

**Writing:** The students are learning how to structure and write a five paragraph literary essay with specific examples and support from our book; we have begun this week with brainstorming and writing an outline.

**Grammar:** The students enjoyed giving their own examples of sentence fragments as well as compound sentences. In addition, they are continuing to write letters to their pen pals at a school for orphans and neglected children in South Africa

to practice their grammar rules. Mrs. Mitchell's (our 3rd grade teacher) son hand delivered the letters this week in Africa, and we are praying for him as he helps to run a camp for the children for a week. Hopefully, he will return with letters for our students from their pen pals.

Music: Our fifth graders began class with prayer and our Weekly Praise Verse (Psalms 100:1-2). Then we spent time listening to the music of our new Quarterly Composer, Bach. Then we had a Music Theory Lesson based on reviewing the Musical Alphabet and the notes of the Treble and Bass Clef. Finally, we enjoyed singing our warmups and Quarterly Hymns.



### MRS. GARRETT

(6TH GRADE)

Math: Using formulas, distributive property, repeating decimals, converting decimals to fractions, converting fractions to decimals, converting percents to decimals, dividing by a decimal number.

Literature: As we critique With Lee in Virginia, we learn how to review historical literature, discover others' perspectives on this specific work, and phrase our critique using well formed sentences. We look forward to reading Around the World in Eighty Days by Verne this coming week, especially after having studied thirteen countries last fall. The students already have a broad understanding of many of the places the characters will visit!

Writing: Supporting quotations as well as further synonyms to flesh out the original motif are aiding the students to write in a detailed, thoughtful manner, as well as pondering the deeper meanings behind the quotations. The letters that the students wrote to their pen pals at the school for orphans and neglected

children in South Africa have finally been delivered by Mrs. Mitchell's son. We are praying for him as a class as he helps to run a camp for the children for a week. Hopefully, he will return with letters for our students from their pen pals.

P.E.: Ultimate Frisbee along with new stretches keep us active and learning teamwork skills as well.

**History:** Reconstruction in the South after the Civil War proves to be a debatable topic as the students see behind some of the political curtains such as the poll tax which caused imbalance in the representation of voters in the South.

Latin: We are transitioning from review and translation work to more new vocabulary and new grammar concepts. We began this week with the chapter 17 vocabulary and learning the irregular "possum" verb - to be able. The students did an excellent job writing conversations using this verb!

Music: Our sixth graders began music class with prayer, and we started a BBC Documentary about our new Quarterly Composer, Bach. On Thursday, we had our History of Hymns about, "Christ the Lord Is Risen Today," and went through some review in Music Theory about the notes of the Treble and Bass Clef. We finished class with warm ups and singing our Quarterly Hymns.

**Science:** We zoom in on the microscope as we learn the function of each part and the methods of examining slides. We look forward to examining some everyday objects up close.

(7TH/8TH GRADE HOMEROOM)


Pre-Algebra: Before the Christmas break we learned how to calculate surface area of a right solid and how to convert very and verv small numbers into notation. Thursday we finished up with a computer game to practice scientific notation. This week we learned how to calculate the decimal part of a number, how to calculate percents, and find the missing number in a proportion. Our first test of the quarter will be next week on Friday, 1/13.

Algebra: Before the Christmas break we started learning how to multiply polynomials using the distributive property and the FOIL method, and then practiced these concepts with a computer application. We continued this week with reviewing multiplying polynomials, and then started to learn what a

> polynomial equation is and how to graph a first degree polynomial by finding paired coordinate solutions to the equation. Our first test of the quarter will be next week on Wednesday, 1/11.

> Omnibus I (7th): We are tackling Plutarch's Lives and C.S. Lewis's Till We Have Faces to start our quarter. Students are already finding the latter to be an intriguing and entertaining story. We look forward to attempting to break down the story's ostensible symbolism using Lewis's own interpretation.


> Omnibus II (8th): We picked up The Song of Roland to start our quarter. This ancient French "song of deeds" is an exciting read and a tale of great poignancy.
