

UPPER SCHOOL CHESS

The first Bradford Academy Tournament Chess recently completed. Thirtytwo students from grades 7 -10 battled over the boards through five rounds conducted over a period of 6 weeks. The tournament was organized using the Swiss format, meaning all players played all five rounds. In each round the participants were each assigned white or black pieces as well as an opponent who had an identical record. The competitors had one week to complete their matches. Most matches were played

during one or more lunch breaks at the DTC. On any given day, several boards would be active with the students studying the situations and planning their attacks and defenses. Some of



The top three finishers received a chess medal (gold, silver, or bronze) and certificate signed by Mr. Johnston and Dr. James. The first place winner was Joshua James, who won all five rounds. Second place was earned by Ethan Fisher, who won four matches, not losing until Round 5. Third place was earned by Olivia White, who also won four matches, losing only in Round 4. Honorable





mention goes to Owen Williams, who was the only other competitor out of thirty-two to win four

matches. Owen's lone loss came in Round 2.

Each Monday during the tournament, Dr. James would meet with the students for 10

minutes during lunch to present a chess tactic on the demonstration board. Motifs such as discovered attacks. forks. pins, skewers, and recognizing exploiting and overworked piece were covered. Some lessons from match play were also presented toward the end of the tournament.

Congratulations to our winners and congratulations to all the participants who improved their skills and made this such a great tournament!



From the Teacher's Desk

Transitional Kindergarten (Mrs. Davis)

Bible

- This week we learned about a new beginning that God gave the world through Noah and the flood. We focused on God's great love through his many promises.
- We also discussed how God gives us guidelines and rules to live our life by because He loves us so much He wants to keep us safe and in line with his perfect order.



- We continued to take care of our garden and harvested the Arugula! What a peppery lettuce we grew!
- The students completed a photography project that was inspired by Ansel Adams. We

hiked all over the 7 acres on our campus and each student chose a favorite spot in nature. Ansel Adams appreciated the beauty and order in nature. Our TK students have now captured the beauty in nature from their vantage point.

Literacy

- We began to break down sentences by identifying the number of words in a sentence through active play. TK learned the importance of putting words in the right order to make a sentence make sense. We concluded the week by building our own sentences and sharing them with the class
- TK also worked on name recognition and writing their name in all capital letters. Each child spent individual time with the teacher practicing their writing and pencil grip.
- Children spent much time this week telling about experiences or was given subjects to speak about. They are working on their speaking skills and confidence in front of peers.
- In reading comprehension students learned how to identify a main character. They continued identifying parts of a book.
- The students began using wet-dry-try method this week practicing their letter writing. By using chalk, wet sponges, and dry paper towels a student is able to practice writing a letter several times to complete the exercise.





Math

- We worked on reading pictographs by comparing the number of boys and girls in the class.
- The students used classroom manipulatives to count using one-to-one correspondence.

Arts and Sciences

- The students enjoyed creating animal masks and making a pilgrimage to an "ark" in the forest.
- The students saw the inner workings of a piano and learned that the piano is a stringed instrument.
- TK learned 4 new songs this week relating to building sentences and about Noah's ark.

Kindergarten (Mrs. Rivera)

Language Arts

 This week our kindergarten scholars were reading three letter words. They sounded them out and matched the words with the correct pictures. Percival introduced the letter "R" to our Phonics Museum. We reviewed the Special Exhibit words to prepare them for reading their first book.

- Upcoming: If your student does not know all their multiplication facts, please come up with a plan to partner with our classwork in order to nail these down this quarter.
- They will need further practice at home on a daily basis. Ideas: Chant the 3's before they leave the supper table: 1x3, 2x3, etc. The next time do the 4's. Pick one fact a day to learn. Write it on the mirror in their bathroom with a wipe off marker: 3x4=12, 4x3=12. Use wrap-ups consistently as extra practice: time them doing one wrap-up, then see if they can beat that time.

- We did not have a new card this week, but we did a big review game of all they could remember from our cards this quarter.
- Next quarter will be a mix of topics: the rise of Rome, the pinnacle of Greece's development, what was going on in Israel during the same time period.

Science

- Field trip to the Greensboro Science Center. Students finished up our study of the world's biomes by making a list of animals that we saw and the biomes where they live. We also enjoyed the amazing aquarium exhibit.
- Upcoming: Next quarter will focus on the solar system, phases of the moon, seasons and planets.

- We wrapped up our first quarter this week with our quarter history presentations and our Odyssey exam. Our presentations covered some fascinating topics, such as ancient Sumerian burial rites, the rise and turbulent history of Athenian democracy, and ancient Mesopotamian entertainment customs.
- It's been a great quarter! I'm really proud of how our 7th Omnibus class has read and interacted with our texts so far.

9th Logic

- We've had a good start to our logic class, completing our unit on truth tables. Next up are formal proofs for validity and the rules of inference.
- It's going to be a great second quarter!

9th History

 We closed our quarter with a final exam, which covered the late Middle Ages through the Age of the Explorers. The modern world has started to materialize in our history class, and we are looking forward with eager anticipation to reliving the history of the 17th and 18th centuries, in particular the emergence of our own country on the world stage.

9th Literature
