RISE ABOVE THE WAVES

Are we called to fight against the corrupt culture of this world? *Or* are we simply called to avoid it? Should we isolate our children from the culture or immerse them in it?

One excellent modern apologist attempts to address some of those questions in his ministry to families and young people. Brett Kunkle is an apologist who has made a living helping teens learn to defend the faith. He worked for years with Stand to Reason, a West Coast non-profit focusing on Christian training. However, he is now launching a separate project, simply called Maven, that is intended more specifically to equip young people. His website (www.MavenTruth.com) states their purpose as: "MAVEN exists to help the next generation know truth, pursue goodness and create beauty, and to equip those who teach and train them—parents, youth workers, pastors and educators—to do the same."

I recently heard an interview with Brett Kunkle in which his shares a very helpful analogy. He compares culture to the ocean and our children are like surfers. For our children to enjoy and ride the waves they need to be introduced slowly and with guidance. Brett is himself a "surfer dude" and loves to enjoy the waves with his own five kids. There are obvious dangers on the ocean but the most dangerous

things are below the surface. Unseen currents, rocks, and sharks can devastate even the most skilled. If Brett wanted to share his passion, he knew his children would need instruction.

Mr. Kunkle began teaching his children to surf by teaching them about the water. They started by splashing in the shallows. He taught them to avoid the dangers but at the same time to enjoy the waves. He showed them how powerful the water can be. They came to respect the waves but also learned how to begin riding above them.

Of course the analogy breaks down because surfing is a pastime one could easily avoid altogether. One might say I will keep my children safe by simply not letting them surf. However, the analogy works because we are all immersed in the ocean of culture whether we like it or not. We need to learn to ride above the waves or we will surely be destroyed by them. Peace and grace.

I highly recommend a video in which Brett discusses these things at the Summit Forum. Please consider watching. It is an hour long and well worth the investment of time.





Transitional Kindergarten (Mrs. Davis)

Bible: This week we reviewed the lessons we have learned since the beginning of school. We will pick up next week learning about the tower of Babel in Genesis 11. The students will see how disobedience and pride lead to destruction. They will also learn that God loves us so much he has saved us from our pride and disobedience. The people (we) cannot get to Heaven ourselves. We do not need a tower to Heaven, we need a savior from Heaven to come and rescue us.


Theme Adventure: We continued to care for our garden. The Arugula quickly grew back from our previous harvest before fall break. We saw evidence of local creatures digging up the spinach we planted. It must be delicious as only a few plants remain. The sunflowers have grown quite tall! We will continue to measure and enjoy the garden in the coming weeks! Forest exploration involved both free exploring and collecting items to make a graph. The students are estimating there are more acorns in the forest than rocks and more leaves than anything else!

Literacy:

 We began learning about prediction. The students have been introduced to new stories

and asked to predict what will happen in the story just by looking at the cover of the book and learning the title.

TK is also continuing their study of sentences. They have learned that words grouped together in order make sentences. They have

skills by telling and acting out impromptu stories directed by the teacher. This week they were assigned words to say when given direction. By next week they will be adding to basic stories, setting scenes, and acting out their own story with a partner.

• The students are now practicing curved lines. We are practicing writing O, Q and the number 0. We continue to review all the other letters and numbers we have already learned this

year.

• The students especially enjoyed using shaving cream as a utensil for handwriting.

Math: We reviewed basic patterns and practiced directional commands. The students began reading and creating graphs. We have begun counting to 10 with one-to-one correspondence. Next week we will begin designing with pattern blocks, sorting by color, and making graphs with the data given.

LOGIC & RHETORIC SCHOOL

Mr. Hamilton

7th Grammar/Comp

We began a unit on the literary elements and poetry this week, focusing on figurative language, imagery, symbolism, and poetic value. In this brief unit our objectives are to come to a deeper understanding of what poetry is, what makes some poems better than others, and how to put ourselves into a position to write simple but effective poems based on nature and human experience.

7th Omnibus

We are reading through C.S. Lewis's classic novel Till We Have Faces this week. This novel, a retelling of the classic myth of Cupid and Psyche, presents us with Lewis's views on such themes as love, self-worth, true vs. false religion, and our own experience of the divine. At this point, we are bemoaning Orual's loss of Psyche to the god of the mountain, but even worse, the revelation of her true feelings toward Psyche, which tend more toward selfishness than generosity.

In logic this week we are working on understanding the rules of inference and their place in building proofs of arguments written in symbolic form.

9th History

In history class this quarter we begin by focusing on the dramatic changes in Europe after the age of the explorers, which spring from the race to colonize and build bases of power in far-flung places. At home in Europe, meanwhile, the path to peace and stability continues, but not without more revolution and war.

9th Literature

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• In our literature class we are reading through Rousseau's *The Social Contract,* one of the many works on political theory to emerge in Europe in the early modern era. At this point, Rousseau has considered several misguided principles upon which to build a government, such as the divine right of kings or systems built on power. Against these, Rousseau posits the social contract, wherein each individual member of society surrenders his or her rights for the good of the whole.

9th Theology

 In theology this week we are discussing political theory in conjunction with literature class.

7th Latin

• This week we have begun to study adjectives and the important "to be" verb, "esse."

8th Omnibus

 We have started off the new quarter with a new book in the history/literature portion of the class: the classic epic poem, Beowulf, which the students are enjoying as a change from the drier history books we read first quarter. In the theology portion of the class, we have started the new quarter by studying three important early Christian documents: the Apostles' Creed, the Nicene Creed, and the Chalcedonian Definition.

8th Logic

 Having considered the truth values of statements in themselves, we are now looking at the truth values of statements as they relate to other statements.

10th Literature

Having finished the classic epic poem, The Iliad, we are now spending some time reading much shorter and simpler (though profound in their own way) writings—Aesop's fables. The collection of fables dates back to Aesop's time in early Greece, but many of them were written much later in the tradition of Aesop.

10th History

 We turn from Plato's classic philosophical treatise *The Republic* to a no-less classic philosophical treatise penned by his esteemed student: Aristotle's Nicomachean Ethics. It is a dense work, but it provides an important investigation into the nature of virtue ethics.

10th Rhetoric

We have spent some time reviewing logical arguments (deductive/inductive) and fallacies (of "form" and of "distraction") in order to see how such arguments provide an important basis for rhetoric. The students enjoyed presenting some logical arguments in the form of rhetorical dialogues.

Mrs. Frueh

7th Grade Science:

- We have begun our highly-anticipated unit on The Celestial Sphere! The students are looking forward to learning more about the objects in space. We began our unit with a discussion of why God created the sun, moon, stars and planets.
- On Thursday, we started a study of the scientific, historical, religious, and political pressures behind the transition from the geocentric to the heliocentric model of the solar system.
- Our unit project is a Moon Observation Log. Students are expected to view and record their observations of the moon daily. This is a great opportunity to get the whole family outside and looking up at the heavens!

8th Grade Science:

The students have had the opportunity to observe and collect data on what actually happens to the temperature of water as it goes through the three phases of matter and then have used that data to calculate the Heat of Fusion and Heat of Vaporization. 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gases.

We started learning about rates and ratios and how to solve word problems using ratios, and introduced the concept of an algebraic equation.
