TO START THE YEAR



Quoting the great political thinker Edmund Burke, Representative Riddell made an important plea for liberty and freedom by means of self government. Our students are blessed to have had Mr. Riddell visit our civics class.

Our high school students began the new year by diving into the fascinating world of politics. Having

focused on the Federal government during Part 1 of the class, the students this week considered Biblical Principles of Government, current issues, and state and local government. The highlight of the week was a visit from State Representative Dennis Riddell (District 64). Mr. Riddell, who is a former teacher, engaged the students in an activity that walked our students through the legislative process. We are very blessed to have him speak to our students and more blessed to have such a kind and godly gentleman working in the state house.



The Civics class is part of Bradford's special Intensive Short Term (IST) program. The IST allows the students to engage in a single subject for intense study for 10 days (5 days at the beginning of the first semester and five at the beginning of the second). The plan has the students focusing on Technology in 9th grade, Civics in 10th, and Economics in 11th. Our 12 grade IST will focus on research and thesis development for our seniors' capstone independent study, their "Senior Thesis." Peace and Grace!

Transitional Kindergarten (Mrs. Davis)

Bible

• This week we reviewed the Bible stories we have learned so far this year. Next week we will begin studying about the life of Moses with specific focus on God's faithfulness and guidance.

• TK also examined Psalm 115:1 and practiced giving glory to God in circumstances the students would understand. This is to help the students better



understand Non Nobis.

Literacy

- We began learning about word families. We practiced recognizing the ending of common words and grouping them into a family. All words that ended with -at would be grouped together. The class has identified 5 word families this week.
- TK also learned about action verbs. The class developed their knowledge through playing charades in groups.
- TK practiced letters with curves as a review. We focused on the direction of the letters O and Q.

Math

- The students were introduced to a balancing scale. They were challenged to compare and contrast the weight of containers holding unknown objects.
- TK continued their work in identifying pennies and counting cents.
- The students reviewed attributes of shapes and copying color patterns.

Arts and Sciences

- The students enjoyed reviewing nursery rhymes they have learned so far this year.
- In music TK continued learning Non Nobis and reviewed some of their favorite songs from the first two quarters.

Language Arts

• We completed our fifth book, The Rig Ran On, about a family's adventures during westward expansion. Review of words that start with vowel sounds, target sound L, reading comprehension for our reader, and listening for the L sound at the beginning of a word.

Math

Language Arts

• Reading: Misty of Chincoteague is our new book. Students continue to develop reading comprehension skills by answering questions verbally or in writing. During oral discussions we learn to become better writers by appreciating the literary style and grammatical choices of great writers, thus combining the disciplines of reading, writing and grammar.

• Writing: Students completed a first draft for the Burlington Writers Club essay and had one-on-one conferences about improvements. I will send an email with specific instructions about submitting these in a couple weeks. The deadline is 2/17/18.

• Upcoming: We are also doing timed reading comprehension practice and a lot of editing practice in order to be well prepared as good readers/writers and also to prepare for end of grade testing. This practice is part of our regular core curriculum.

Math

• Celebrated Phi Day (1/06/18) and learned about the golden ratio that ancient philosophers and mathematicians used in order to create beautiful works. We discovered how prevalent this ratio is in God's creation, pointing us to an intelligent Designer, (google "phi" on youtube for some great information); identifying and solving "larger, smaller, difference" story problems; making, drawing and labeling number sentences for arrays; making an array for a number sentence; finding the missing dimension of an array.

History

Greek Philosophers: Socrates, Plato & Aristotle

Science

• Chemistry unit: This week we traced the develop of thought about atoms from the Greeks, including Aristotle, to Robert Boyle and began making a flip book of the first 18 elements and where they are found in everyday life. We also reviewed what students learned in 2nd grade about the scientific method, states of matter and combustion.

Latin

• Chapter 15: We began this chapter the last week of 2017, and tested on it Tuesday. We began learning about the imperfect tense ending in Chapter 16. Again, we are off of our Friday test schedule at this point.

Music

• This week we enjoyed listening to the beautiful music of our new Third Quarter Composer, Johann Strauss II. We had a music theory lesson based on measures and time signatures, and we finished class praising God with our quarterly hymns!

• While studying Phi and the Golden Ratio, we looked at several paintings by Da Vinci & Raphael, discovering how much math is found in the preparation of these beautiful works. 4th Grade

Language Arts

• Reading: "The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe." Students have entered the land of Narnia and are holding their breath awaiting the adventures to come.

• Writing: Fourth graders are learning the art of descriptive language and character development from C.S. Lewis; we began by looking at and learning from his detailed description of the faun, Mr. Tumnus, as well as that of Edmund's first view of the land of Narnia. After several lessons of preparation, character, setting, and conflict improvements, students at last began to write their stories that will serve as their entries for the Burlington Writers' Club contest.

• Grammar: This week's focus has been on capitalization and punctuation rules and practice.

Math

• Students learned subtracting a fraction from one, finding a fraction to complete a whole, and writing quotients with mixed numbers; students also took their power-up and cumulative assessments and completed an investigation about line graphs.

History

• St. Francis of Assisi: Students got to know the monk who gave up all of his earthly riches for Christ, loved nature, and put on the very first Christmas nativity scene. Science

• Earth Science: We reviewed the layers of the earth, focusing on the crust, and began looking at the forces behind earthquakes and tsunamis.

Latin

• Students began this quarter by learning the declension of *duo*, *adding several monetary words to their vocabulary, and writing a short story or performing a short play (mostly) in Latin.*

Enjoying Latin: students performing a play using
mostly Latin words, including all of the words from
this week's vocabulary.



Music

• This week we began class listening to the beautiful music of our new Third Quarter Composer, Johann Strauss II. Our music theory lesson was based on measures and time signatures, and we picked up our recorders and learned the notes for, "Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star."

Art

• Fourth graders began drawing their cities in one point perspective this week. We reviewed the vanishing point and other concepts related to perspective as we drew!

5th Grade

Language Arts

Reading: We continue reading Duel in the Wilderness, watching the rookie Washington learn how to lead men much older and more experienced than himself.

Writing: After reviewing conversation punctuation, character development, and plot creation, the students began and finished the final drafts of their stories.

Grammar: The class continued to study apostrophes, their use and a test covering their various applications, along with an exercise with hyphens.

Math

We learned about geometric solids, surface area and volume; adding multiple fractions and adding and subtracting mixed numbers; and how to classify and organize quadrilaterals.

History

We concluded our study of the French and Indian • War by making posters of the main people, events, and outcomes. We then began learning more of the later consequences of the war - the bankrupt British passed the Sugar Act, the Stamp Act, and other tax bills in an effort to pay off debts; they end up angering their colonists.

Science:

Introduction to Astronomy: Students reviewed the solar system and the phases of the moon and got a brief glimpse of the exciting things to come this quarter in science. You might notice your child looking at the night sky studying the moon or looking for a certain star, planet, constellation, or even just a small part of our Milky Way galaxy.

Latin

After completing the vocabulary review, we began to learn about the irregular possum verb and making Latin sentences into questions. This gave us a lot of opportunity to practice writing our own Latin History sentences and conversations!

The class dove head first into writing short stories • for the Burlington Writer's Contest.

An in depth look at discovering the theme or themes of a piece of literature, and exciting exercises to uncover themes using textual evidence.

Listening to C.S. Lewis' descriptive writing gave • the students a better understanding of how they will be using descriptive settings to draw the reader into their short stories.

Spelling and vocabulary words taken from the Scripps National Spelling Bee.

The class spelling bee and school spelling bee allowed students to practice their knowledge of the spelling words, and stay calm under pressure.

Math

The class continued to practice more complex cross multiplication and scientific notation equations. along with a Timed Test to measure speed when evaluating adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing fractions.

The causes of The Civil War were discussed, as • well as the broader understanding of the various states across the union and their individual decisions

affecting the rest of the country. The existing and emerging political parties of the 1850's, historic court rulings, Frederick Douglass, John Brown and Harriet Tubman were all discussed with

great interest amongst the students. The importance of our own words, and the difference our words can make in shaping events as Frederick Douglass did, were examined. Vocabulary and spelling, as well as reading God's Word along with rich literature all bring truth, noble ideas and words to our minds which can be passed along to impact culture and communities.

LOGIC & RHETORIC SCHOOL

Mr. Hamilton

7th Grammar/Comp

• This week we examined the key elements of a work of literature and began working on our own

versions of short stories, focusing on developing plots with meaningful internal conflicts.

7th Omnibus

• We have begun reading several of Plato's dialogues, focusing on *Euthyphro and Phaedo*. The former is a still-relevant discussion of the nature of piety and includes the famous "Euthyphro Dilemma": is something approved by the gods because it is holy, or is it holy because it is approved by the gods? If we accept the first option, then we are left with the difficulty of explaining where morality comes from, or what it is rooted in. If



we accept the second, then morality seems arbitrary. This led us to a discussion on the nature of right and wrong from a Christian point of view, during which we concluded that the truth is somewhere in the middle: what is holy is so because it is approved and commanded by God, but it is approved and commanded by God because of who he is; God's commands are rooted in his nature.

9th Logic, Literature, History, and Theology

• No classes this week due to the Civics short term.

Mrs. Frueh

7th Grade Science:

• We started our unit on The Moon with a detailed discussion of the difference between weight and mass. See if your child can explain the difference to you and explain how to use mass to calculate weight. We also studied the surface features of the moon.

• Next week, we'll be learning about the phases of the moon, the moon's role in tides on Earth, and how lunar eclipses occur.

8th Grade Science:

• We began the new quarter with a challenging, but fun logic puzzle to review the periodic table trends that we learned last quarter. We began our investigation of compound chemistry today with a lesson on the difference between ionic and covalent bonding.

• Next week, we will learn how to write and balance chemical equations, as well as identify what type of reactions are represented by chemical equations.

7th Pre-Algebra

• We began our new quarter with distance formula word problems (Distance = rate x time), always fun! We worked more on solving fraction proportion problems and word problems. We reviewed the origin and meaning of Pi, and how to use it to find the circumference and area of a circle. We advanced to two-step solving of algebraic equations, using both addition/subtraction and multiplication/division to isolate the variable.

Test 16 - Monday, Jan. 22

8th Algebra I

• We started our new quarter with percent increase word problems, then did more advanced simultaneous equation solving, using

substitution, by learning how to rearrange the equations first into the right form to solve. We learned how to calculate the volume and lateral surface area of Right Prisms and Cylinders, how to express subsets and the subsets of Real Numbers, and ended the week with square roots.

Civics Among the 9th and 10th Grades

One of the major projects of the week was the creation of a constitution for student government at Bradford Academy.
