7th Grammar/Comp

• In grammar class this week we focused on crafting thesis statements and writing effective introductions and conclusions, all in preparation for our quarter four academic paper.

7th Omnibus

• We are reading through The Early History of Rome in our Omnibus class. As we continue to read of Rome's slow but steady move toward a more democratic form of government, we have been both inspired and horrified as we encountered numerous wars, acts of treachery, and acts of heroism, all of which paved the way for Rome's development.

9th Logic

• This week in logic we continued to work with truth trees, this time using them to show self-contradictions and tautologies.

9th History

• After wrapping up our study of the transformation of the American West, we turned again to Europe to finish out our quarter, learning of the massive social and cultural changes taking place, especially regarding women and the arts. Growing pressures, as well, are beginning to move the world toward the point of no return.

9th Literature

• This week we are reading Marx's *Communist Manifesto*. While some of Marx's observations of 19th-century social imbalances have merit, we have discussed how many of his claims are either highly dubious or completely unfounded. In addition, in his radical attacks on religion, marriage, and the family, we can readily see the evil spirit that is animating his communist ideology.

9th Theology

• In theology class this week we have focused on a Biblical critique of communism. Among the truths we have highlighted is the Christian's right to experience the joys of earth and the fruits of his labor, the Christian's right to private property, and how the sharing we observe in the New Testament is entirely voluntary. Mr. Miller

7th Latin

• This week we took a quiz on our last new set of vocab words for the quarter and began learning the imperfect and future tense endings for third conjugation verbs.

8th Omnibus

• This week the students enjoyed dressing up and performing another Shakespeare play—Macbeth. They brought some great costumes and have put on an entertaining performance of this famous tragedy!

8th Logic

• We worked on test corrections this week and also learned about three types of immediate inferences that can be drawn from a statement as a logical equivalent: converse, observe, and contrapositive.

10th Literature

• This week we finished up our discussion of the apocrypha with some very interesting stories (Tobit, Judith) and also an example of wisdom literature (Wisdom of Solomon). We discussed many interesting parallels between these books and certain Old Testament books.



10th History

• We continue following Josephus' eyewitness account of Rome's war with the Jews in the first century as he relates many of the horrors of the siege of Jerusalem. We see, according to Josephus, that the leaders of the Jewish rebels (the Zealots) shoulder more blame than the Romans for the suffering the Jews experienced during the siege.

10th Rhetoric

• The students spent time this week writing an introduction to a speech that contains the four forms of meter we discussed: iambs, trochees, anapests, and dactyls. They will present them next Monday.

7th Grade Science:

• The students continued work this week on their "Students as Teachers" project. They are learning how to use reliable sources to research and write their lessons and how to present their learning to the class in a clear, logical, and understandable format.

8th Grade Science:

• The remainder of the year will be spent studying physics. The first order of business in this area of study is making sure that we all understand how to make reliable scientific measurements. This week we learned about the difference between the Imperial (or English) system and the SI (or metric) system. We discussed why the metric system is used for scientific investigation and will spend time learning

how to convert units within the metric system.
