GRAMMAR SCHOOL

Transitional Kindergarten (Mrs. Davis)

Bible

• This week we learned the story of Jesus commanding his disciples to allow the children to approach him after some time teaching. We focused on Jesus' great love for humanity, especially children. TK learned that Jesus loves them and can be trusted.

Theme Adventure

7th Grammar/Comp

• We are continuing to work on our academic papers in class. Students are persevering in their research and starting to flesh out outlines and first drafts. This has been an excellent quarter so far as we have had our first venture into the world of the academic paper!

7th Omnibus

• In our Omnibus class this week we explored William Shakespeare, the man, the myth, his work, and his world. After wrapping up with a discussion about what makes Shakespeare the greatest writer in the English language, we went on to explore Julius Caesar, Shakespeare's tragedy which explores, among other themes, the use of rhetoric as a tool to gain and wield political power.

9th Logic

• This week we continued to work on putting real-world arguments (real language arguments) into symbolic form.

9th History

In our history class, we have arrived at 10th Literature World War II, the most devastating conflict in human history, where we are discussing everything from its causes to its tragic consequences.

9th Literature

• We have wrapped up our brief discussion of Mein Kampf, noting, among other things, its shocking proclamation of Aryan superiority and its vitriolic discourse on the Jewish people. Next up: Animal Farm, the fable and modern-day morality plav about inevitable regression of communist states into totalitarianism and terror.

9th Theology

 This week in theology we have discussed many themes related to our study of both history and literature, including the reasons for the emergence of totalitarian regimes in the early 20th century, the ideology behind 20th century racism, and much else. Next up in theology: Christianity and Liberalism by J. Gresham Machen.

Mr. Miller

7th Latin

 This week we continued familiarizing ourselves with third declension adjectives and practiced translating sentences that contained them.

8th Omnibus

• We finished reading the engaging poem Sir Gawain and the Green Knight this week! We discussed important themes that are woven throughout the story regarding honor/virtue, testing/trials, and sin/repentance. students also began taking notes on the poem to be used in writing their final papers relating to the medieval world of this time.

8th Logic

We reviewed enthymemes this week and also had a quiz on them. Then we began learning about hypothetical syllogisms, which consist of "if ... then" statements.

This week we read and discussed the first few books of Ovid's anthology of myths entitled Metamorphoses. We have enjoyed coming across classic, beloved tales such as "Pyramus and Thisbe" (the basis of "Romeo" and Juliet") as well as delightful, insightful tales such as "Echo and Narcissus" (which provides a powerful picture of "narcissism" and an account of the word's origin).

10th History

• The first round of student-led book discussions went well this week as we read and discussed Lucretius' philosophical poem The Way Things Are. We are finding Lucretius' account of "the way things are" to be somewhat odd (and just plain wrong) in places, yet amazingly brilliant for his time as describes precursors scientific ideas contemporary and discoveries.

10th Rhetoric

• We talked about the idea of "stasis" in rhetoric, which involves finding a "standing place" on which to base what one will be trying to persuade his or her listener of and so order one's argument in the most effective way. The students put this into practice by composing short arguments with a clear, intentional "stasis" that reflects one particular point of disagreement contention between them and their audience.

7th Grade Science:

stratigraphic superposition, and the fossil record. We made a very detailed study of Carbon-14 dating, Uranium-Lead dating, and Potassium-Argon dating, discussing both the usefulness of each method, as well as the assumptions and limitations of each. We've also contrasted the Uniformitarianism and Catastrophism theories of geology.

8th Grade Science:

- This week we've spent more time exploring the details and implications of Newton's Laws of Motion, including distinguishing between weight and mass and using the famous formula, F=ma, to solve for Force, Mass, or Acceleration.
- Students should be completing the margins and summaries of their notes each day, as well as practicing calculations taught in class.

7th Pre-Algebra

- This week we learned how to solve basic algebraic equations followed by 2 days of review for the test this week.
- Parents, please spend time with your students going over their homework. Help your child with understanding how to add, subtract, multiply, and divide with negative numbers. A lot of them struggle with that concept. Also, help them with fractions. I am a little nervous for some of them as we get into more advanced algebra next year. They need to know how to do this math.

8th Algebra I

• This week we learned how to recognize the different shapes of graphs of different nonlinear functions and how to use the difference of two squares theorem. We then spent two days reviewing everything for this week's test. • Please take time to go over homework with your child. We have studied a lot of material this year, and the homework gives examples of past material, so help keep it fresh in their minds.

Mrs. Gregory

7th and 8th Music

• We spent some time listening to the quarterly composer, Gershwin, and our music theory lesson was about harmonic and melodic intervals, counted out the intervals of given notes. We finished class singing and practicing our music for the last day of school performance.

9th/10th Algebra 2

• This week, we enjoyed reviewing various polynomial factoring patterns with a scavenger hunt game. We continued learning about logarithms - solving log equations, meeting "e" - pi's cousin, and playing "log war". The test initially planned for Fri will now be on Monday.

9th Spanish 1

• We are closing the week with a test on the first half of Unit 5: distinguishing between ser and estar (two verbs for "to be"), talking about weather, seasons, and months of the year, and speaking in the present progressive tense (verbs with "-ing"). Next week we begin travel vocabulary and direct object pronouns!

10th Spanish 2

• This week we've been working on our irregular preterite verbs. They are so irregular that the most effective way to memorize them is in song. The students will be quizzed on this song Monday morning! For the rest of the week, they'll be working on a presentation that requires them to narrate in the preterite tense.
