8th Omnibus

• We've been reading through our final book of the year, *The Merry Adventures of Robin Hood*, which is a compilation of legendary stories about the famous outlaw and his band of merry men. The students are also continuing to work on their final research papers about the medieval context of *Sir Gawain* and *Canterbury Tales*.

8th Logic

• We recently began our final unit of the year covering informal fallacies. We've studied and are learning how to detect three main categories of informal fallacies: distraction, ambiguity, and form.

10th Literature

• This week we read most of George MacDonald's greatest fairy story, *Phantastes*— a work that had a profound influence on C. S. Lewis, among others. We began discussing some of the major themes in the story, such as "death" and "love" (and how these show a relationship to the classical myths we recently read), while trying to understand some of the seemingly random happenings of the rather unconventional tale.

10th History

• This week the final group of book presentations ended with the completion of Marcus Aurelius' *Meditations*. The students did a great job leading us through these last three difficult philosophical texts!

10th Rhetoric

• The students continue to prepare their

final speeches, which they will present next week! These must follow the speeches classical form, consisting of an exordium, narratio, partitio. propositio. confirmatio. refutatio, and peroratio. (You may be able to discern what some of these sections are—if not, ask one of the students!)

7th Grade Science:

- This week we continued to practice calculating mineral density and read more about properties used for mineral identification. We also began discussing the three different classifications of rocks.
- The last test of the year on Rocks & Minerals will be taken on Thursday, May 24th. This will also be the last notebook check of the year. All margins and summaries for science notes should be complete before Thursday's test.

8th Grade Science:

- This week was light due to standardized testing. We did have some time to discuss the concept of energy and the fact that, although energy is a fundamental aspect of our universe, physicists still can not explain exactly what energy is or where it comes from. They can only explain how it works. Coming to terms with this fact, once again shows that the laws of the universe only make sense in light of an eternal Creator that is outside of space and time. Hopefully, our discussion of potential and kinetic energy will also give the students some insight in making final adjustments to the design of their self-propelled vehicles.


